### Area centered on Pirahã

This area captures a genetically highly diverse area of Amazonia. The unusual characteristics include:

- The absence of various 'normal' characteristics of language (no numeral-noun modification, only plural imperatives, no personal pronouns, no reciprocals)
- Exuberance of semantic distinctions (degrees of remoteness in tense, many possessive classes, many genders)
- Object-Subject word order
- Juxtaposition/zero marking for constructions (relative clauses, conjunction, argument marking)
- Some unusual phonology: ejectives, implosives, glottalized resonants, missing /g/
